

First, you will need to find out the original selling price and rare value if the print is sold out (if a rare value has been established). All of our rare values (expressed on our website as “estimated current value”) are based on actual reported resale of the prints (after market). If there is no “estimated current value” listed, we have had no sales reported back to us.

To find these prices go to our website [www.pbuckleymoss.com](http://www.pbuckleymoss.com) and perform a search for a print. When searching, you can search by title, subject, year or any combination of these. Be creative. When you find the print that you are looking for, simply click on the picture, or the title of the print, and you will be taken to another page that has detailed information on the print.

Find out or estimate your framing cost, and assess whether or not your frame and matting are in good condition. We cannot help you with frame prices, but you could take the piece to a local frame shop and ask them for a value on the framing.

Please note: We cannot resell your pieces or buy them back. We have the following suggestions for selling them.

-Find a local art gallery that will take your pieces on consignment to sell. The gallery will usually ask a percentage of sales of the pieces.

-If you have a high priced piece, or a collection, you may want to contact an auction house to auction these pieces.

-If you are a Moss Society member, you may advertise through the Moss Society newsletter. It is published monthly. The contact information for the Moss Society is as follows:

-You can also try to sell the prints yourself. Many of our collectors use eBay for both buying and selling. You could list your pieces and set a minimum bid amount that will be accepted. Our experience is that you may not get the best price here, as there are many pieces listed.

-Another option is to consider an art donation to a non-profit who will use the artwork to fund their program. One to consider would be the P. Buckley Moss Foundation for Children’s Education. Donated artwork is auctioned off and the money raised goes towards scholarships and grants for those who learn differently.
